Making Changes, As The World Has

Some of the changes have expanded our capacity; others have marred our souls. The world is not the same. We are not the same, and we can never go back to how it was. We can only go forward.

The Church is one of the things that has changed.

Cultural Christianity—participation in a church for civic, rather than spiritual, reasons—was already on the decline in the United States. In the past, participation boosted one's professional or political standing or was a social expectation. Church, while pleasant or at least benign, was not deeply compelling. People connected to churches for these reasons were already silently disconnecting and drifting away; however, the pandemic dramatically accelerated this trend.

Especially for us here in the Southern US, the cultural Christian disconnection was still happening so gradually that many could ignore it and pretend it was not happening. That is no longer the case. For the first time in the history of our country, more people do not have a relationship with a church than do. While the majority of American adults recognize that they have spiritual needs, they are not convinced the American Christian church can help them meet them.

The purpose of the Church is to fulfill the mission of Jesus Christ, who sends us to make disciples. According to Matthew 28:18-20, this involves baptizing them and teaching them—helping them initiate this faith journey as well as assisting them to grow in it. To fail to do these (both of these) is to fail to follow Jesus.

How will we share Jesus with our world of Anniston and Calhoun county? How will we invite them to meet Jesus? Where will we have to go to engage those who aren't coming?



This isn't about taking away what meets your spiritual needs. It is not an either-or situation. There's more than enough room at Jesus' table for all of us. It is simply about making room in our hearts, in our lives, in our Church to meet the spiritual needs of others. Think of it more as pulling up another chair at the table than having to give up your seat.

As I write, we are in a sermon series on Leadership because bold, biblical, grace-filled leadership will be needed in the days ahead, not just by your pastors or staff but by us all. You are needed to help us move forward into the future God has for us. You are needed to help us find the balance between maturing the disciples already entrusted to us as well as making new ones.

Our Advent sermon series, beginning November 28, is The Inn: Housing the Holy. As we enter this season, let us consider how we will make room for the holy in our lives, including the holy mission of sharing Jesus with the world. This will position us to enter 2022 with renewed vision and commitment to Jesus, our Church, and our mission.

The world has changed, and we must make changes as well. Join me in praying for our future and for those who need the life more abundant and free that Jesus offers.

Isaiah 30:9-10

Like any other community or organization that adapts to new challenges and opportunities, we too have experienced many changes over the years. Over the years, we welcomed new members into our church family, and we became a seasonal church family for others. Finally, we said goodbye and blessed fellow sojourners who went their separate way. Amid our transitions together, I discovered that when successful, we produce unique disciples at Anniston First. I unintentionally learned this particular lesson through both direct and grape-vine criticism we received. Over the years, I have heard these, and similar sentiments: "Anniston First is a lost cause...a poor financial investment...will never be successful downtown...should abandon downtown for a campus in Golden Springs."

I never find these misguided criticisms originating from otherwise well-meaning individuals credible, but I do understand where they come from. The work before us at Anniston First is not easy work. I dare say that our ministry context provides unique challenges most churches around us do not face. Often, the criticism we receive originates from genuine experiences of frustration, weariness, exhaustion, and discomfort. For some, existing as an expression of the Kingdom of God at 1400 Noble Street is just too hard. It asks too much of us—too much time, too much commitment, too much energy, too much creativity, too much money.

Would it surprise you to discover that new churches are more often than not planted in population areas experiencing or expecting substantial population growth? Moreover, they are planted in overwhelmingly homogeneous suburban communities rather than rural or urban communities, low-income communities, or communities of color. Do you know why?

It's easier. It's faster. It's safer.

Isaiah reminds us of our fondness for "smooth things"--the familiar, easy, comfortable, and convenient. Our biological tendency is to avoid discomfort, tension, and conflict whenever we can. Even in creation, we see rudimentary substances like water move to areas of least resistance rather than areas of greater resistance. It's much easier that way. Most of us, myself included, don't go looking for adversity. Yet, theolo-

Such grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a man the only true life.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer

gian Dietrich Bonhoeffer once said the cost of discipleship is high, and Jesus reminds us that the road that leads to life is narrow. Yes, it's much easier to spend our time in faith communities that reinforce rather than challenge our political ideologies and theological convictions weekly. Yes, it's more comfortable co-existing with others who share our same socioeconomic status instead of being confronted with homelessness and poverty on the doorstep every week. Of course we would prefer to limit faithfulness to worship on Sunday instead of committing to justice and service throughout the week. Placing ourselves in diverse faith communities among people who think, vote, worship, look, and love differently than we do is a counter-cultural decision to choose "the road less traveled." Robert Frost "gets it," doesn't he? A prophetic existence is not for everyone, but it does make a difference.

When other churches fled downtown Anniston for more convenient locations, you remained committed to transforming our community. You elect to do ministry in a setting and in a way that many, if not most churches, avoid. Disciples of Jesus raised on the corner of 14th and Noble are **resilient** and **unwavering**.

However, we must also be attentive to our human limitations. We can't transform our community when we succumb to burnout, over-commitment, exhaustion, and cynicism.

Be gentle and patient with yourself and with each other.

Observe Sabbath rest and play.

Spend time with those who support you.

Rest.

Practice self-care.

Invest in your spirituality. This winter, individual and group opportunities are available to cultivate a more profound spirituality. In addition, more in-person and digital options to grow deeper in your faith are available. The Church has changed, and giving must change as well. COVID has reminded us not to rely on the Sunday morning offering plate alone. Livestreaming services, virtual Bible Studies, outdoor worship, virtual choir rehearsals, and Podcasts continue to become part of our creative "new normal." Still, we must remember the importance of regular giving as a faithful response to the ministries from which we benefit spiritually. Though engagement with AFUMC from a distance may be helpful to many of us, it can also make maintaining regularity in our giving challenging. Now, more than ever, we must capitalize on electronic giving options available to us. Just like at home, the bills go on. At Anniston First, we make giving as easy as possible for you by providing multiple giving options, including:

Regular bank draft deduction | Online Giving | Text giving | Give by mail | In-person Sunday giving

Taking advantage of the option for regular deductions from your bank accounts or regular online payments from their Credit Cards or Debit Cards is helpful to the Church and the contributor. The Church can rely on steady income to pay your bills and your staff. The contributor is liberated from using multiple ways to keep up with their giving. Electronic giving happens regularly, and you can plan on the periodic deduction(s) from your account. Even though we may miss you on a Sunday morning, regular deductions or virtual giving lets us know we can still count on your gift.


